# **Course Description**

Everyone has a story to tell, and in this class students will develop their own stories as they relate to the cultures of England and Ireland by creating audio and video projects on location. We will examine digital media as a tool for seeing, exploring, and expressing cultural identity. While visiting ancient sites, cathedrals, and museums and attending concerts, students will document their experience as a participant observer during this important moment in their lives. You're invited to take advantage of this opportunity to develop your cultural competency and sensitivity in the process of documenting intercultural stories in England and Ireland.

## **Assignments and Grades**

#### **Assignments**

Assignments- There will be 5 Assignments at 20 points each (10%).

# **Assignment 1**

# 1 minute hometown video introduction

Write a one minute introduction to your community. Use the video feature on your phone to document a one minute story of your hometown. Go to a location and take a panorama shot of a place in your community. While you are taking the one minute one shot, you will read or recite the one minute of dialogue introducing your hometown.

#### **Assignment 2**

#### 1 minute audio of an event

This is a news story about an event we will attend. You will do some research prior to the event, attend the event, then reflect on the event in your audio story.

# **Assignment 3**

# Prezi, PP, or Imovie photo story of a selected topic and location

This is a photo presentation of a topic of your choice at a location of your choice.

### **Assignment 4**

# 2 minute video story of a location

This is a 2 minute video story. Include an introduction with relevant historical information, focus on the importance of the location, end with a summary and concluding thought.

# **Assignment 5**

#### 2 minute video story of a focused issue

This should be focused on an issue or topic important to you. This is a 2 minute video.

#### **Iournal**

Daily entries to be graded three times during the program. These written journal enries will be used used to develop a digital diary. They will also be used to develop personal interviews and a partner interview.

## **Presentations**

• Presentations – Assignments and Group Projects will be presented to the class (10%)

### **Participation**

• *Participation* - Your personal interpretation of and thoughts on the assigned Readings and presentations of Assignments and Group Projects (5%).

# Wix Website

• Wix Website- This is the place where all of the digital stories, Assignments and Reading Reflections will be posted and graded (20%).

### **Group Project**



• *Group Project* – TBA This is a collaborative effort of students. Groups will be determined by interests. (20%)

## **Post Trip Assignment**

• *Post Trip Assignment*- This is a summary of your written reflections. It can be audio or video. (25%)

# **Course Requirements:**

**Participation** - Attend the planned excursions and be engaged in the discussion groups held to help students reflect on the activities since the previous discussion. Excused absence from planned trips and discussion will be handled on a case by case basis (i.e. illness).

**Daily Journal with reflection** – Students are expected to document their learning experiences each day through a written journal. The journal will be evaluated each morning at breakfast. Professionalism is expected in written and on-line media.

**Post Trip Assignment-** A composite of your daily journal is due upon return (date TBA) and will be posted on your Wix Website. This should be an audio or video recording summarizing your written reflections focusing on lessons learned, best moment, worst moment, halting moment and boon (the lesson you will you take home to teach others).

#### **Final Exam**

No Final Exam. There is a final reflection on the Journal. Prompts will be given in class. There will be a presentation of your Individual and Group Projects.

### **Graduate Students**

Graduate students will lead a Group Project. The project will require preproduction research and postproduction editing and posting. Graduate Level daily journal needs to focus specifically on the topic of your choice.

#### **Honors Students**

Honors students will lead a special project with the group. The topic is the student's choice and will focus on his or her field of study. It will require preprodution research and post production editing and posting.

### **Pre-Trip Reading Assignments**

Read all the content of the links under Readings (listed above). Post a reflection of the readings on your Wix Website. What was the most important thing you learned from the Reading? What did you not understand? How do you think you might incorporate the reading into your Assignments?

Pre- trip assignments including reflection on Readings 1-6 and Assignment 1 are due TBA and can be posted on your Wix Website. You will email me the link to your site.
